GRANDCHILDREN OF HIROSHIMA

The Grandchildren of Hiroshima is an oral history and performance project, rooted in interviews between survivors of the Atomic bomb and children in Hiroshima. The project culminated in an intergenerational, community performance in Hiroshima in August 2015: the 70th Anniversary of the bomb.

2014 – A group of children were trained in oral history techniques and the company digitally recorded 18 interviews between the children and survivors of the A-bomb: "hibakusha".

2015 — These interviews were developed into a play 'Grandchildren of Hiroshima' performed in Hiroshima by an intergenerational group of Hiroshima residents.

AFTER HIROSHIMA

Between December 2014 and March 2016 London Bubble ran an intergenerational oral history and performance project which explored how the dropping of the first atomic bomb, on August 6, 1945, was reported in London and how the longer term response grew into the peace movement of the 1950's and '60's. 'After Hiroshima' was performed in London in 2016.
